



Kalaupapa Place Names: Waikolu to Niihoa by John R.K. Clark


Making Waves: Traveling Music in Hawai'i, Asia, and the Pacific


Beyond Ethnicity: New Politics of Race in Hawai'i

Examines the work of two lesser-known Hawaiian writers – Joseph Ho'ona'auao Kanepu'u (1824-ca.1885) and Joseph Moku'ohai Poepoe (1852-1913) – to show the rich intellectual history preserved in the Hawaiian language newspapers. Kanepu'u and Poepoe created a record of Hawaiian cultural history and thought to transmit ancestral knowledge to future generations.



Death Rites and Hawaiian Royalty: Funerary Practices in the Kamehameha and Kalākaua Dynasties, 1819-1953 by Ralph Thomas Kam

Drawing on missionary journals, government publications and Hawaiian and English language newspapers, this book describes changes in funerary practices for Hawaiian royalty and details the observance of each royal death beginning with that of Kamehameha in 1819. Dozens of historic drawings and photographs. Descriptions of the burial sites provide locations of the final resting places of Hawai'i's royalty.
